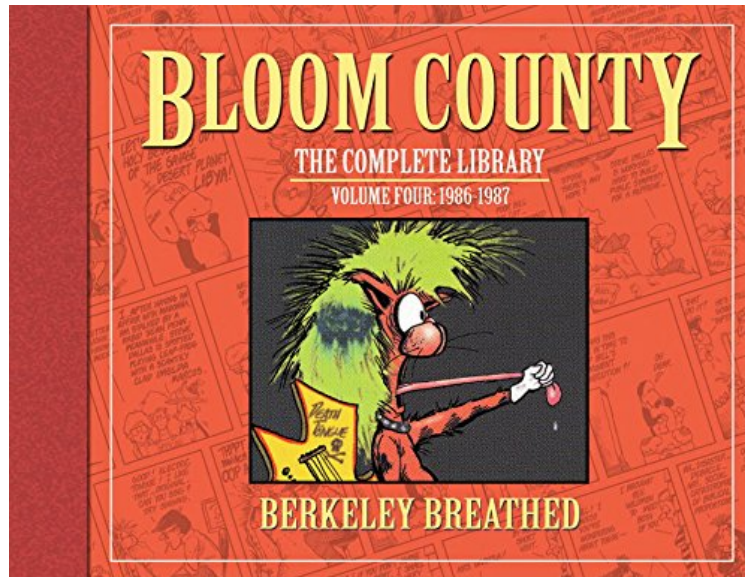

2 of 2 people found the following review helpful. Can't view it in landscape mode on KindleBy Greg J. LovernAs many others have complained, the Kindle version is restricted to portrait mode. Unlike volumes 1 and 2, you can't view it in landscape mode. You can double-click on a panel to view it in panel mode, while still in portrait mode, which is a big improvement. But you can't see all the panels at once. Which is especially silly for the Sunday strips, since there is plenty of room to see more panels above and below, but instead that space is wasted. Whoever is responsible for releasing these books like this really ought to be fired. Yes, "Daddy Shawn", it works much better with Comixology. I installed Comixology on my old 8" Dell Android tablet running KitKat, and it worked great. Then I installed it on my son's 7" RCA Android tablet (also KitKat), and it worked great on that too. I assume Comixology is available on Kindle Fire, since it's just a special Android tablet. HOWEVER, it won't work on e-ink Kindles. Thus my two stars.3 of 3 people found the following review helpful. All they had to do was take the same content as the original three volumes and put out the remainder of the books in the same format. Seriously its not like they had no guide to go by as volumes 1-3 were excellent. The follow-on editions almost unreadable, especially on smaller screens. Aside from pure greed and a desire to rush these out as quickly as possible, I don't know what possessed the publisher to completely screw up the formatting for volumes 4-9, but they did. It will not let you change to that view which makes reading the text balloons impossible on a 8" or smaller tablet and even very difficult on my 32" computer display as the data is

crunched down to the smallest possible view. This has been a problem since at least 2012 according to the reviews I've read. Since I can't read it there is no point in buying any more. Sorry Mr. Breathed, but I ain't paying \$8.00 for something I can't read no matter how good.

Book Four of Berkeley Breathed's Eisner Award-winning series and New York Times best-seller features some of the most fondly remembered Bloom County cartoons, both from a humor standpoint and from a biting, political one. This is the period for which Breathed won a Pulitzer Prize, the highest award in journalism, for editorial cartooning. Breathed is one of only two cartoonists to win a Pulitzer for editorial cartooning (Garry Trudeau was also a recipient for *Doonesbury*). This volume begins more than six weeks after the strips in Volume Three conclude. This is because of a near-death experience suffered by Breathed, who, having broken his back in an ultralight-plane crash, was unable to continue his daily grind and the strip went on hiatus for nearly two months. Breathed went on to incorporate some of his experiences into one of the most famous Bloom County sequences ever — Steve Dallas breaking his back after being attacked by an enraged Sean Penn!
