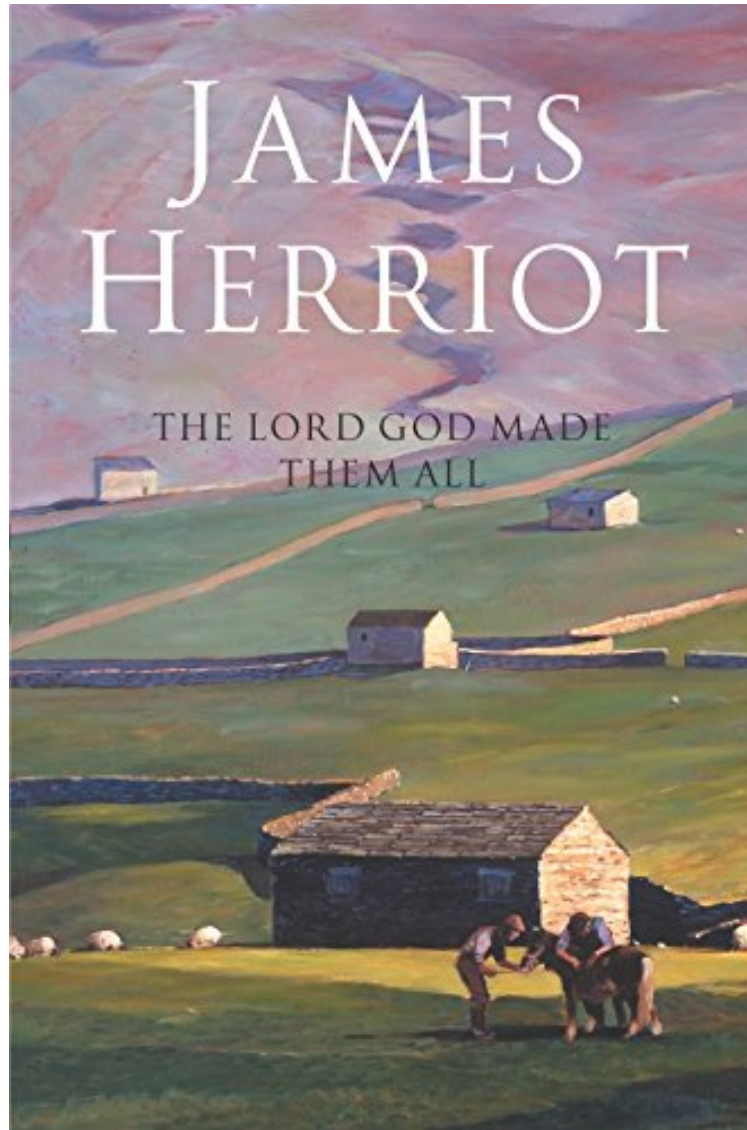

They are full of humor, with occasional pathos. There is a lot of Yorkshire dialect that could be off-putting in the beginning, but you can generally guess what people mean and if you keep reading, you will become familiar with it. The books would lose a lot of their flavor if everything had been put into standard English. "De-Stress" By Linda Prince I have been a fan of the audio books for several years. They are great "de-stressers". This year my husband has begun to listen and feels the simplicity of the stories and the relationships are uplifting. It is as if we were returning to the ways of our parents and the times when integrity was essential for one to live comfortably in one's own skin. The writing is superb and the narration captivating. The language is reflective of the times. Cursing was never used toward the public but intimate to one's own private expression. While the moral antidotes are refreshing, this would be a caution for children. There are audio stories directed for children specifically, however. PBShop US was the vendor.
